Program Spotlight



Emergency Grants for Rural Health Care Organizations

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development has announced up to \$500 million in financial support to help rural healthcare facilities,

tribes, and communities increase access to COVID-19 vaccines, essential services, and nutrition assistance.

The program consists of two types of assistance: Recovery Grants, aimed to support immediate healthcare needs, and Impact Grants, designed to support the long-term sustainability of rural health care. Long-term sustainability is defined as "improved health outcomes, improved access to quality health care, and creating and maintaining sustainable economic development for small communities." Funding for the program comes from the 2021 Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Emergency Rural Health Care Grant eligibility

Since the two types of grants within the program serve different purposes, they have different eligibility requirements.

Recovery Grants

- Facilities must be organized as a public body, nonprofit, or federally recognized Tribe
- Funds must be used in correlation with the COVID-19 pandemic, to help prepare for a future pandemic event, or to support food assistance
- Applicants may request between \$25,000 and \$1 million in grants

Impact Grants

- Facilities must be organized as a public body, nonprofit, or federally recognized Tribe
- Funds must be used in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic to improve healthcare outcomes or access
- Applicants must establish a network of entities comprised of three or more healthcare organizations
- This grant type requires cost-sharing or matching funds
- Applicants may request between \$5 million and \$10 million

All applicants must be located in a rural area *and* must primarily serve rural residents. Click <u>here</u> for more information on eligibility requirements and frequently asked questions.

- Recovery Grant applications will be accepted until funds are exhausted. Initial applications are due by 4pm local time on October 12, 2021.
- Impact Grant applications are due by 4pm local time on October 12, 2021.
 Note that late applications will not be accepted.

Program Spotlight



Financial Assistance for Non-Profit Arts Organizations

The Kansas Creative Arts Industries Commission (KCAIC) within the Kansas Department of Commerce is offering support for arts non-profits that have been financially impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The KCAIC is dedicated to promoting, supporting and expanding Kansas' creative industries and enriching communities through arts and culture.

The Short-Term Operational Support program provides immediate one-time grants to non-profit arts organizations facing financial hardship due to unforeseen circumstances beyond their control. These grants are designed to assist with the day-to-day operations that are critical to the success of these arts organizations. Funding for this program comes from the National Endowment for the Arts through the 2021 Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Short-Term Operational Support program eligibility

 Applicants must be non-profit 501(c)(3) arts organizations based in Kansas whose primary purpose is to produce, present, promote, or serve the arts • Individuals, government agencies, university/community college departments, political groups (among others) are not eligible to receive these grants

- Applications are open through September 4, 2021

Applications will be reviewed by a committee of KCAIC and Kansas Department of Commerce staff. Grant recommendations and reviews will be presented to the full KCAIC Board, which will make final determination based on available funding and size of qualified applicant pool.

Allowable uses

Short-Term Operational Support funds may only be used for the following expenses:

- Salary support
- · Costs for the services of contractual workers
- Facility operational costs such as rent and utilities
- Costs for health and safety supplies
- Marketing and promotion costs

Award amounts will be dependent on the recipient's facility and payroll costs. Awarded funds may be spent starting on the award date through December 31, 2021. Extensions may be made on a case-by-case basis.

Note that if a grantee is receiving emergency funds from other federally funded sources (including Small Business Association programs), they may not "double-charge" the same expense to the multiple federal sources.
