This form is intended to be completed by parties interested in submitting investment ideas to the SPARK Advisory Panels, as it pertains to the allocation of Kansas' State Fiscal Recovery Funds (SFRF) as part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). An overview of the Treasury Department's Final Rule summarizing the major provisions of using SFRF can be found at this link while the entire Final Rule can be found at this link. Please be aware that there are several other funding sources (e.g., Local Funds, Infrastructure Bill, etc.) with different provisions that may better fit certain investment ideas.

In making decisions, SPARK will adhere to the following guiding principles:

- Prioritize sustainable programs & investments through one-time use of funds vs. substantial expansion of existing services
- Combine with / leverage local and agency funds to maximize use of discretionary funds
- Foster long-term systemic impact for Kansans
- Consider equitable opportunities and outcomes
- Enable flexibility within investment strategies
- Ensure results are measurable to enable tracking & transparency

The intended use for the funds requested in this submission to the SPARK committee is to support the development of new Family Resource Centers (FRCs) in high-need areas across Kansas while strengthening the network tying them together to enable sharing of data and best practices. Mixed-use facilities such as FRCs improve access to social services programming and benefits navigation by providing these in the same location as concrete supports, such as childcare centers. The development of these FRC will meet the SPARK guiding principles of fostering long-term systemic impact for Kansans through increased access to services and childcare and ensure equitable outcomes by addressing underserved communities. FRCs will help fill a gap in quality, licensed childcare availability exacerbated by the pandemic which has led to workforce shortages as parents have dropped out to care for children at home.

Example Response:

Target outcomes:

- Prevention of child maltreatment
- Prevention of out-of-home placement
- Truancy prevention

Target beneficiaries: families with children at risk of State intervention, maltreatment, truancy, and/or law enforcement protective custody. With these additional funds, FRCs in Kansas could positively impact 400-800 families (~25K/family) across the state. Although the funding would be used directly in one year, intervening now can make a life-long change for these children.

Example Response:



There are numerous studies and examples showcasing the effectiveness and value of FRCs. Empirical evidence includes:

- A 45% reduction in cases of child abuse and neglect in Alachua County, Fla.
- Significantly lower rates of child maltreatment investigations in communities with FRCs in Allegheny County, Pa.
- Statistically significant gains in family self-sufficiency in Colorado.
- A 20% increase in parents' self-reports on their ability to keep the children in their care safe from abuse in Massachusetts.
- A 25% increase in the probability that a family reduced its risk of abuse with the addition of one additional differential response case management visit per week at an FRC in San Francisco.

Additionally, FRCs have already proven successful and effective in Kansas and deserve additional financial support to further their positive impacts. In Kansas, FRCs have:

- Reduced reports of child hunger by 25%
- Reduced instances of school truancy by 30% in its target population
- Prevented, on average, over 150 out-of-home placements per year
